# THE LEGACY OF SLAVERY IN THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH

On Sunday, February 9, after the 10:30 am Holy Eucharist in Corlett Hall, join the Rev. Grey Maggiano and the Rev. Kathy Walker for a discussion on the Episcopal Church's legacy in both the subjugation and liberation of Black Americans. While many know of Juneteenth (June 19, 1865), the legacy of slavery has persisted in America. Through stories from Tarboro, NC, Miami, FL, and Baltimore, MD, Grey+ and Kathy+ will explore how this history continues to shape our present. This conversation is a supplement to *The Color of Compromise* series but is open to all.

On Saturday, February 22, you are invited to join us on a pilgrimage to Historic Stagville in Durham, NC, one of the largest plantations in the South and a site that bears witness to the enduring legacy of slavery.
